27th SculptFest April 26 – 28, 2019 Entry Deadline is January 30. No entry or booth fees, no commissions charged. Large tents are provided by the City of Round Rock.

I am pleased to report that renowned first time exhibitors are coming to SculptFest from Ohio, Michigan, New Mexico, Arizona, and Washington State. Entries received in advance of the deadline indicate SculptFest is evolving into a national level show. Many of these preeminent artists plan to exhibit large sculptures that will remain on Centennial Plaza for an extended exhibition when the Allan Houser Exhibit is removed in May.

Digital Sculpting TSOS Special Interest Group.

Based upon interest expressed in preliminary discussions, there appears to be a sufficient number to establish a group to meet periodically to develop skills using digital sculpting and painting software. Applications of technology to create digital sculpture files include: (a) 3D printed sculptures that can be direct casted in bronze - lost 3D print vs. lost wax, (b) CAD - computer aided design - milling of Styrofoam as armatures for large sculptures to add clay over

sculptures in jpg and other digital formats for presenting sculptures in virtual space such as websites without incurring the cost of creating solid objects. Please let me know if you want more information about the possibility of forming a TSOS Digital Sculpting Special Interest Group.

Featured Sculptors - Preliminary List:
Renowned first time exhibitors are coming to
the 27th SculptFest from Ohio, Michigan, New
Mexico, Arizona, and Washington State. Many
these preeminent artists plan to exhibit very
large sculptures that will remain on Centennial
Plaza for an extended exhibition following the
Allan Houser Exhibit.

The extended exhibition on Centennial Plaza in April 2019 will include sculptures created by David L. Deming, Candyce Garrett and members of the Indigenous Sculptors Society.

David L. Deming, of Cleveland, has enjoyed a successful career both as a sculptor, a teacher and arts administrator. He has exhibited his sculpture in over 100 competitive and invitational exhibitions nationally and internationally with over 50 one and two-person exhibitions. His sculptures are in over 100 public and private collections. His experience includes teaching Sculpture and Design, and Dean, College of Fine Arts, University of Texas, Austin, and President, Cleveland Institute of Art. A number of Deming's large sculpture will be exhibited at SculptFest and remain on Centennial Plaza. http://demingart.com/

Cliff Fragua, of Jemez Pueblo, New Mexico, is one of the Indigenous Sculptors who will be at SculptFest and in the extended exhibit on Centennial Plaza. Cliff was awarded one of the most prestigious commissions for sculptors in the United States. His rendition of Po'pay, leader of the Pueblo Revolt against the Spanish in 1680, represents the State of New Mexico in the National Statuary Hall in Washington, DC. The sculpture is made from Tennessee marble, and stands 7 feet tall, mounted on a 3 feet tall pedestal. Cliff was a student of Allan Houser, and is the recipient of numerous awards. His

sculptures are in many permanent collections. Cliff is a past president of the prestigious Indigenous Sculpture Society. https://www.singingstonestudio.com/

Candyce Garrett, of Taos, New Mexico, is the world's preeminent female, monumental granite sculptor. She was honored in 2016 to be one of the four international sculptors invited by Japanese granite artist, Keizo Ushio, to go to Japan and carve a piece in memory of the Tohoku Tsunami victims. Candyce worked with Jesus Moroles and regularly teachers stone sculpture workshops. With Texas ranching in her family and creativity in her blood, she prefers the desert southwest as her backdrop. Large sculptures created by Candyce currently on exhibit at Angelo State University will exhibited at SculptFest and the extended exhibition on Centennial Plaza after SculptFest.

David Deming

To all of my old Texas Sculptor friends as well as new, I am grateful for the opportunity to be a featured Sculptor at the Texas Society of Sculptors exhibition this coming spring in Round Rock.

As many of you know, I spent 28 years exhibiting my work and teaching sculpture in Texas, first for two years at UTEP and then 26 years at UT Austin. After serving 2 years as the Dean of the College of Fine Arts at UT, I left Texas in 1998 to become the President of The Cleveland Institute of Art where I received my BFA back in 1967. I retired from the academic side of my career in 2010 and have devoted almost every waking hour since to my studio work until my wife calls me and tells me to get my butt home. Annie has been doing that now for 53 years., and I always go right home when she calls...sort of!

My 28 years in Texas served my sculpture career well as I had great gallery representation at the former Adams Middleton Gallery in Dallas. I was able to continue developing two distinctive

directions in my sculptural output during that time and continue to do the same now.

Those directions are mostly welded or cast metal abstractions large and small, many of which are scattered in public and private collections across the country.

Reynaldo Alaniz Austin Texas

During the Diez y Seis *celebration at the MACC in September a stone sculpture bar Reynaldo Alaniz was unveiled on the grounds of the Mexican American Cultural Center here in Austin.

Reynaldo Alaniz was commissioned by the City of Austin to create Maya, a hand-carved limestone sculpture of an abstract female figure. The piece was commissioned by TEMPO, the Austin Art in Public Places temporary public art program. Maya was exhibited in Austin's Edward Rendon Sr. Park in November 2017 as part of the East Austin Studio Tour, and can now be viewed in the Zócalo of the ESB-MACC on a one-year loan from the artist.

The sculpture was inspired by a Mayan figure called a Chacmool, which is a type of stone statue that has been found at archaeological sites such as the Mayan pyramid of Chichén Itzá and several Aztec sites near Mexico City. The Chacmool is a reclining figure whose head is turned completely to the side, legs raised, with a flat area on the abdomen where sacrifices were placed. There is no definitive knowl-

edge of where and when they originated but archaeologists have associated them with the Aztec rain deity Tlaloc due to markings found on some of the Chacmools.

Maya is a hand-carved limestone sculpture that invites the viewer to consider the history of Mexico's indigenous past. The placement of the sculpture in relation to the ESB-MACC building is reminiscent of the Chacmools placed outside Mesoamerican temples. Maya isn't an exact replica of a Chacmool, but is a modern adaptation that uses simplified lines and minimal detail to evoke the presence of the ancient figure while holding its own as a contemporary art piece.

John Maisano Austin Texas

I have 3 shows this year at galleries (and hopefully the TSOS show again. One already happened in Santa Fe at Worrell Gallery (my first solo show), One in Sedona at Exposures coming in October, and one at Russell Collection on West 6th which will be a holiday show with me as the featured artist.

Two of my sculptures were accepted into the **Waco Sculpture Zoo**, a permanent exhibit of larges sculptures, my "Hearts Unfolding" heron and "Big Roxy" fox.





SCULPTURE ZOO RIVERSIDE SCULPTURE PROJECT

Stretching from Baylor University to McLennan Community College, the Brazos River corridor runs through the heart of Waco, incorporating natural and cultural resources that include Cameron Park and the recently designated Downtown Cultural District. Located next door to historic downtown and at the convergence of two rivers, Cameron Park is an oasis with dramatic cliffs and ancient trees; a network of hike and mountain bike trails; and a delightful, natural habitat zoo. The Brazos River corridor is already home to an outstanding collection of public art that includes approximately forty sculptures; the most recent being Waco Chisholm Trail Heritage, created by renowned sculptor, Robert Summers. The purpose of this project is to build on an ongoing effort to provide quality public art in the river corridor through the issuing of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for sculptures to be placed near the vehicular and pedestrian entrances to Cameron Park Zoo from the park. The proposed subject matter of the sculptures is animals found in the zoo and their symbolic or cultural meaning.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

I create stylized animals in bronze at various scales. My work is sold in galleries around the country and installed as various monuments around Austin, Texas and beyond. I've worked as exhibit designer and artist-in-residence at the Texas Memorial Museum at the University of Texas at Austin since 2000. I've also been involved in two Dino Pit projects, one for the Austin Nature and Science Center and the other for Williamson County. I'm proud to be a member of the Texas Sculpture Association and the Texas Society of Sculptors.

Before moving to Austin, I was exhibit designer and artist-in-residence at Yale University's Peabody Museum of Natural History in New Haven, Connecticut for twelve years. My sculptures reflect my influences of working in the museum world for the past twenty-seven years. The stylized forms are based in Art Deco and Art Nouveau and the designs carved into them are influenced from Celtic, Tribal, Inuit, Polynesian, and Native American design and trans-

formed into my own style. Movement, strength of pose, purity of line and form are how I approach creating my designs. The designs sometimes tell a story, convey the spirit of the animal, and describe the location of the animal's origins. The beauty of monumental sculpture is the interactive component. My large Frog (Garden Prince), Turtle (Peaceful Warrior), and new Snail (Slow Journey) are all designed to be seats for kids and adults. I believe that being able to touch the forms and interact with them solidifies the appreciation of the work.

My monumental works can be found on the University of Texas at Austin campus, Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center, Zilker Botanical Garden, Austin Nature & Science Center, Camp Swift in Bastrop, Downtown Bastrop Sculpture Project, Celina High School in Celina, Texas, and in a variety of private collector's gardens. I currently sit on the Board of the Umlauf Sculpture Garden in Austin.

OLANIYI R. AKINDIYA AKIRASH Austin Texas

Akirash has exhibited with TSOS multiple times in our Annual Georgetown Library Show. He continues to develop and produce a growing body of work. He has sent information about some of his most recent work. "I would like to share this with you and others.

First - a commission I just completed at the office of Facebook in Austin as part of Facebook AIR Program they are doing all over the world in the offices. Images of work at Facebook below "QUEST & QUESTION".



What's FaceBook AIR? In 2012, Facebook started the AiR program, an artist residency that takes place in its corporate sites.

First of all, what is a residency? Generally, artists collaborate with organizations to achieve particular pedagogic goals. Terms and time are defined with a contract. Their work must serve to raise awareness and to initiate the public to artistic expression. Meanwhile, organizations support total production fees."

Facebook explains the program as « an initiative out of Facebook's Analog Research Laboratory, an inhouse analog design/print studio that was created by Facebook designers who wanted a place where they could step away from their screens and get back to their roots as physical makers. » Since its creation, AiR has supported more than fifty artists and spread the site-specific art project initiative through its international campuses. Facebook employees are encouraged to interact with artists and to take part in these projects. By stimulating creativity and bringing new visions, art benefits to the company brand image, work environment and employees productivity.

"Second - I will be doing a solo exhibition at LAWNDALE ART CENTER in Houston opening Dec 7th, 2018.

Exhibition title is "ARA ORUN KINKIN - MAS-QUERADES MYTHOLOGY". It will be on view until March 2019.

My work focuses on moments of time, fleeting moments that can be easily forgotten or transformed. Reflecting on rural versus urban life, the accelerated pace of development and social infrastructure, my works and performative activities play around social subjectivities with dramatic components, breaking down conventional barriers, in exploration of the invisible systems of power that govern everyday existence.

Standing at the intersection of creative engagement now described as trans-disciplinary art, I utilize a multitude of techniques and materials, including re-purposed objects which may manifest in mixed media

painting, sculpture, installation, video, photography, sound, performance.

While inscribing all these mediums in my comprehensive compositions, my works achieve an accumulative density that overwhelms with spectacle, grandeur and wonderment.

Ultimately, my work is designed to create comfort, peace, and solace. I believe that art can be a balm to the soul, revealing a quiet inner truth. My art is a reflection of the joys of life, directly inspired by rhythm, harmony, and the movement of daily existence."





Georgetown Sculpture Tour

Several TSOS members are in the new *Tour* which has just installed for its year long exhibit throughout downtown Georgetown, Texas.

"The City of Georgetown's Arts and Culture Board started an outdoor sculpture tour in 2010 in San Gabriel Park. Over the years tour locations have shifted predominantly to the downtown square, an official Texas Cultural Arts District. The intent of the program is to provide public art in the Most Beautiful Town Square in Texas for residents and visitors to enjoy and space for Texas sculptors to showcase their works. The Arts and Culture Board would like to extend the number of sculptures featured to a total of fifteen. There are eleven pieces dplayed in this year's tour."



Frank Maglio had one of his outdoor sculptures "Jumping Through Hoops" installed at the entrance to the Georgetown library – it will be there until fall of 2019.



My goal as an artist is to build a story that is not always readily visible; a story that provokes a thought or hopefully many thoughts. A story for you find your own path to your own conclusion and to enjoy the journey along the way.

This sculpture at first glance looks like some type of animal jumping through a ring. That being the case, one could think I saw that - let's move on. Fair enough, but maybe a second view shows the ring or hoop as I like to call it is our world, our universe, our life. This hoop is welded to one broken heart and one half of a heart. So maybe this is a statement that whatever you attempt if done half heartedly more than likely you'll be broken hearted and that could be part of your world for a long time or even become the foundation of your world.

If you look at the metal pieces that attach to the hoop or the universe, we see at the base a short stubby piece. This could represent the strength of how we start. The base itself is a

perfect circle without holes which possibly represents birth and the continuation of life. Back to that short stubby piece between it and the rest of the piece that attaches to the hoop (the universe), there appears to be a nut without sides or threads and a bolt unfinished with no head or threads. The lack of those finishing touches may mean that our attachments to the future have more strength and connections than to the past.

The metal attaching to the hoop (the universe) is tapered front to back, like the blade of a sword. Maybe that represents our path. A path that keeps a sharp focus on a cutting edge of what is the good and bad in the journey of our universe, our desires, our heart breaks, and the quality of life we forge.

The subject of the sculpture appears to be some sort of animal. Some believe it to be a deer with a busy tail, others see a squirrel, and others have thought it to be a llama. In reality it is all of these and none of them. It does represent all of us, our dreams, ambitions, and tireless determination to carry whatever heavy loads we encounter. Like the deer we must be alert to change and use swift intellect to avoid things that are detrimental. Like the squirrel we must plan for the future, the harshness of many different kinds of winters. Like the llama to be able to carry the heaviest of loads through the harshest of environments. Where our legacy will be, we were better for having been here than not.

Of course, this maybe what one person might see in this sculpture where someone else may see something totally different. That is why in this reflection there are maybe's, could be's, and appears to be because it is not the value of what I think is important, it's what you think that contains the real value.

All I can say is thanks for looking and thanks for thinking outside the box even for just a moment.

SOM is in the third year of a program that started in 2016 with a grant from the Texas Commission on the Arts and support from the Smithville Area Chamber of Commerce's Keep Smithville Beautiful committee, Smithville's Richard D. Latham Cultural District, the City of Smithville, the Lost



Pines Artisans' Alliance, and local business sponsorships. These works are displayed for about 11 months, with an Artists' Reception held during Smithville's Festival of Lights event on the first Saturday of December after the sculptures are first installed.

The community has shown great interest in the wide variety of sculptures that have come to town through this program—artists have submitted abstract, whimsical, and representational works. The Smithville community has enthusiastically supported this and other art projects, including the Youth Banner Program (also funded in part through the Texas Commission on the Arts), the "Arts Bridging Community" Art in Public Places projects (partially funded through the National Endowment of the Arts), and the "Enrichment Days" art and movement programs in Smithville public schools (funded through the Smithville Education Foundation).

Organizers reach out to sculpture artists to enter their existing creations for a small entry fee (\$25 for the first entry, \$10 each for up to two additional entries). Each year, entry forms are available in summer and are due by mid-October. Sculptures must be installed by mid-November.

Be a Part of Boerne's Public Art Program—Submit a Sculpture to the 2019 Art al Fresco Competition!

Art al Fresco, the annual public art competition in Boerne, Texas, is currently seeking applicants for its 2019-2020 year-long exhibition. A walkable art adventure, Art al Fresco has become an integral part of the city's growing public art program, placing large-scale sculptures around Boerne's historic downtown, the Boerne City Campus and along its popular trail system. This temporary exhibit is chosen from a national call for artists and entries are reviewed and selected by Boerne's Public Art Competition Committee (PACC).

Artists receive a stipend for participating in the program, and sculptures are considered for purchase by the City at the end of the competition. So far, five sculptures from the two previous exhibits have been acquired and have become a part of Boerne's permanent public art collection. These are "Bull" by Jeffie Brewer of Nacogdoches, TX, "Foundation of the Doo Dah" by Dewane Hughes, Troup, TX; and "Solar Wind," by Patricia Vader, Martinez, CA; "Dancer" by Jerry Daniel of Sanger, TX, and "Comet & Raven: Messenger from Afar" by Joe Barrington of Throckmorton, TX.
