To the fearful eye, all is threatening. We hope art will liberate you from that indifference and bring you wonder, pleasure, ,joy and love. Like physical exercise, artforms have health benefits as well as wholesome pleasure. After all, health and balance were central to the core meaning of the ancient word "salvation." The loving eye helps extract us from being entangled with the agenda of privileged power, seduction, opposition, deceit and complicity. If that is subversive, so be it! The fearful eye is always besieged by threats and the greedy eye is always haunted by what it does not yet possess. The artful eye is the loving eye, in love with beauty and at the same time in love with that which we sometimes think is inferior or beneath us. Art has a way of filling the cup and sloshing over onto other things. I am reminded that the tongue, organ of speech, is also the seat or organ of taste. Speech is sullied by the lack of taste. Like fast food, much of our speech is of "fast food" variety. Art, like Poetry, is an attempt to renew language

and recover its power of expression, and its intent, purpose and meaning. To see a page of poetry is to see gaps and holes, white spaces where the light can shine through. One mark of colonization or occupation by a foreign power, is the attack on language in order to suppress the inner person.
